

**2020 AP History Exam – DBQ Scoring Rubric – 10 Points**

Contextualization (1 pt)	<p>Describes a broader historical context relevant to the prompt.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Under what circumstances and in what historical environment did the prompt occur?</li> </ul>	/ 1 pt
Thesis (1 pt)	<p><b>Responds to the prompt</b> with a historically defensible claim that establishes a line of reasoning.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Thesis must make a claim that <b>responds to the prompt</b> rather than restating or rephrasing the prompt. Advice: Be sophisticated; answer comprehensively.</li> </ul> <p>NOTE: Presents a logical counterargument and argument pertaining to the subject of the prompt. Argument must be <b>developed and supported by at least three points of evidence (A, B, C).</b></p>	/1 pt
Evidence (5 pts)	<p>Provides at least <b>TWO specific examples</b> of evidence per paragraph relevant to the prompt.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>To earn the <b>first point</b>, the response must include specific historical evidence relevant to the topic of the prompt. Two per paragraph is the expectation, but more is better.</li> <li>To earn <b>two points</b>, the response must use the evidence <b>to support</b> your argument.</li> <li>To earn <b>three points</b>, the response must use the evidence <b>to support</b> your argument.</li> <li>To earn a <b>4<sup>th</sup> point</b> use at least one piece of OUTSIDE historical evidence relevant to an argument about the prompt.</li> <li>To earn a <b>5<sup>th</sup> point</b> use at least one piece of OUTSIDE historical evidence relevant to an argument about the prompt.</li> </ul>	/5 pts
Analysis/ Reasoning (3 pts)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>To earn <b>1 point</b>: For <b>one document</b>, explains how or why the document’s point of view, purpose, historical situation, and/or audience is relevant to an argument.</li> <li>To earn 2 points: For a <b>second document</b>, explains how or why the document’s point of view, purpose, historical situation, and/or audience is relevant to an argument.</li> <li>To earn 3 points (<b>COMPLEXITY</b>): Demonstrates a complex understanding of the focus of the prompt, using evidence to corroborate, qualify, or modify an argument that addresses the question.</li> </ul> <p>NOTE: For Complexity I strongly suggest <b>Post-Contextualization</b>, which continues the logical narrative by stating the short and long term effects of your argument as it applies to the prompt. You can also use synthesis or a counter-argument paragraph.</p>
